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Time capsule - a journey into the past

Have you ever wondered what it would be like to travel back in time or what people in the future will want to know about us? With a time capsule, you can do just that!

A **time capsule** is a container in which you store objects from the present day in order to find them again in the future. This allows people many years from now to experience how we live today.

A famous example is the **Westinghouse time capsule**, which was buried for the 1939 World's Fair in New York. It contains everyday objects such as a pair of sunglasses, a toy doll and seeds to show the people of the future how we live.

The **first time capsule** was created in **1876** to celebrate the 100th anniversary of the USA. It contained books, newspapers, photos and even a telephone system!

Would you like to create a time capsule yourself? Here's how:

- 1. **Choose a container** that is durable and waterproof.
- 2. **Collect objects** that represent your life and the present day. For example, photos, letters, toys or a newspaper.
- 3. **Pack the items securely** so that they are not damaged.
- 4. **Label the time capsule** so that people know when to open it.
- 5. **Bury or hide the capsule** in a safe place.
- 6. Make a note of the location and date so that you or someone else can find it later.

With a time capsule, you can send a**message to the future**. It's exciting to think about what people will think about us many years from now. So why don't you give it a try and create your own time capsule?

\bigcirc	Bury or store the time capsule in a safe and memorable location.	
\bigcirc	Choose a durable and waterproof container to protect the contents over time.

Our city is full of amazing buildings. There's a big dome on the cathedral, built by Brunelleschi. It was finished before I was born, in 1436, but it's still the tallest thing I've ever seen. The buildings here are made in a new way called Renaissance style. They have lots of columns and arches, like in the old Roman times.

There are new inventions too. Not long ago, in 1450, Johannes Gutenberg invented a printing press with movable type. Now, books can be made faster and more people can read them. Father says knowledge is spreading everywhere.

Life here is full of music and art. Festivals happen often, with people dancing and singing in the streets. Traders come from faraway places, bringing spices and stories. They talk about Christopher Columbus, who sailed across the ocean in 1492 and found new lands.

If I could hide some things in a secret box for someone to find later, I would put in one of Father's small paintings, a printed page from a book, and a coin with the image of our city. Maybe someone in the future will find them and learn about our lives in this year of 1503.
